Directions to The Farm from Spokane International Airport (GEG)

We will be offering a shuttle service from the Spokane airport to the farm round trip for \$20/person, please call the farm to reserve your space.

1. Follow flint rd to US-2 E
2. Continue on US-2, take I-90 E to Division St in Spokane. Exit
3. Follow Division St/US-395
4. Follow US-395 to Deadman Creek Rd in Ferry County
5. Go up Deadman Creek Rd 4 miles turn right onto Jacknife Lookout Rd
6. Continue up Jacknife Lookout Rd 2 miles and turn into the farm- Large sign Dreamcatcher with horse.

Directions to The Farm from Castlegar BC (YCG) Canada

1. Turn left onto BC-3A
2. Use right lane to take the BC 3W ramp to Castlegar/Grand Forks Trail
3. Follow BC-3 W to US-395 S
4. Follow US-395 to Deadman Creek Rd in Ferry County
5. Go up Deadman Creek Rd 4 miles turn right onto Jacknife Lookout Rd
6. Continue up Jacknife Lookout Rd 2 miles and turn into the farm- Large sign Dreamcatcher with horse.

79.4 miles | 100 minutes

Directions to The Farm from Trail Regional Airport (YZZ) Canada

1. Head south on Waneta Hwy/BC-22A S toward Park Rd
2. Continue onto Northport-Waneta Rd
3. Turn left onto Northport-Boundary Rd/Northport-Waneta Rd
4. Sharp right onto WA-25 N/Center Ave
5. Sharp left onto Northport Flat Creek Rd
6. Turn right onto US-395 N
7. Follow US-395 to Deadman Creek Rd in Ferry County
8. Go up Deadman Creek Rd 4 miles turn right onto Jacknife Lookout Rd
9. Continue up Jacknife Lookout Rd 2 miles and turn into the farm- Large sign Dreamcatcher with horse.

Area Attractions

Outdoor adventures samples of the area:

Emerald Lake

Emerald lake is a small beautifully colored lake that is truly rustic and does not have any amenities. This lake is accessed by foot from the Trout Lake Trail Head by the [Hoodoo Canyon Trail #17](#) that intersects with the Emerald Lake trail and is just a short 4.8 mile hike. Although there are no fish in the lake, wildlife and wildflowers are abundant. From Kettle Falls, WA: Head west on US-395 N for approximately 3.7 miles. Turn left onto WA-20 W for 5.2 miles. Turn right onto Trout Lake Rd (Forest Road 020) and continue for 5.1 mile to Trout Lake. From the Hoodoo Canyon Trailhead at Trout Lake continue up Hoodoo Canyon Trial #17 for 1.4 miles to Emerald Lake.

Hoodoo Canyon Trail #17

This 2.5 mile trail crosses the south fork of Deadman Creek then climbs the ridge above the creek. Views of the Kettle Range and the spectacular Hoodoo Canyon. The trail from the canyon ledge to Emerald Lake is steep and is recommended for experienced hikers.

Douglas Falls In Colville, from Hwy 395 jct, drive east on Hwy 20 for 1.1 miles to Aladdin Rd. Turn left (north) and drive 2.0 miles to Douglas Rd. Turn left and drive 2.9 miles to the park. Douglas Falls is a scenic and gorgeous cascade along Mill Creek, located in Douglas Falls Grange Park, near Colville.

The viewing area for Douglas Falls is right beside the parking area, and easily accessed.

The terrain is very steep around the waterfall. There is a loop trail that goes around the falls.

Marble Creek Falls In Colville, from Hwy 395 jct, drive east on Hwy 20 for 1.1 miles to Aladdin Rd. Turn left (north) and drive 2.0 miles a junction. Continue right on Aladdin Rd. for another 10.5 miles to unsigned Road 200 on the left. Turn here and park. From the unsigned turnoff, look for an unmarked trail leading up the north side of Marble Creek. It is an unclear trail, and overgrown. After a short distance up this trail, you will see Marble Creek Falls on your left. The cliff is too steep to get down to the falls' base, and the view is mostly obscured.

Historical adventures in our area:

Kettle Falls Historical Center

Our center interprets the Kettle Falls fishery, which has been described as one of the most important historical sites in the Western United States. The center also interprets other historical sites, including the historic St. Paul's Mission, Hudsons Bay's Fort Colville and U.S. Military's Fort Colville .

St. Paul's Mission, and views of the former sites of the the Falls and Fort Colville (now under water), are points of interest along our short interpretive trail. Also look for the old portage road, historic cemetery, and ancient harpoon sharpening stone.

Meyers Falls Dam - Kettle Falls, WA

Upper Meyers Falls

In Kettle Falls, from Hwy 395, drive south on Juniper St. for 1.1 miles to the turnout on the right for Meyers Falls.

Upper Meyers Falls is a small 15 ft. drop along the Colville River in the town of Kettle Falls. It is located immediately upstream from a hydro power facility at (lower) Meyers Falls.

This 24.5 foot high dam replaced the original timber-crib dam built in 1915 which failed in 1961, necessitating the construction of this dam. The first hydro station, near the dam, was built in 1903, with upgrades taking place in 1910 and 1915, with further development taking place at later dates. It is still operational and supplies power equivalent to that required by about 1,000 homes. A second generating station was added across the river in 1915 and both continue to produce power. In 1830 a gristmill was built by the Hudson's Bay Company on the river above the dam and continued in use until after the first generating station was built. Interestingly, this early use of the Colville River, makes it the oldest source of water power in continual use west of the Mississippi River. The Meyers Falls Power Plant was placed on the National Register of Historic Places on June 29, 1995.

In addition to its commanding profile along the rail lines, the Colville Flour Mill retains within its walls a complete and remarkable assemblage of milling equipment and apparatus which chronicles the working life of the region's major roller mill. Central to the agricultural needs of the Colville Valley, the mill's evolution recounts the major agricultural shifts within the county and the growing diversification of grain crops. The main and original portion of the mill measuring thirty-two feet by forty-two feet was constructed in 1905, with operation of the mill beginning in 1906. On the north side, a stacked plank, crib grain elevator was added in 1930. (Another grain elevator was built on the opposite side of the street in 1941.) The entire east end of the building is now covered by a feed mill which was constructed in 1950. The exterior of the feed mill exhibits the same horizontal siding as the original building. The added feed mill rises higher than the rest of the structure, and features a low gabled roof on the projecting center of the structure and small windows for ventilation. In spite of these historic additions and some more recent remodeling, the mill's exterior presents a mostly uniform exterior with narrow clapboards, stacked plank walls, and doublehung sash. All the equipment on the second, third, and fourth floors of the mill are intact and open to the public.

Historic fire lookout restored in Colville National Forest

From Colville: Drive west on state Route 20 to Kettle Falls, then continue for another 28 miles. Take the turnoff to the right at Sherman Pass and drive down the short road to Kettle Crest trailhead.

Walk north on the trail. At two miles, you'll meet the Columbia Mountain Loop trail. Turn right (east) and hike 0.5 miles on the spur trail until you reach a junction with the loop around Columbia Mountain. Continue straight on the spur to reach the lookout.

Weather

Dreamswept Farm is in the Kettle River Range at about 3400 foot elevation. With sweeping views of the surrounding mountains. During May, our weather is usually in the mid 60's to mid 70's during the day and quite crisp after sunset. Most days will have a light breeze. Our area does not generally see a lot of rain this time of year.

We have a small indoor working area, and two outdoor arenas (80 x 120 and 150 x 300) with pipe fencing. Meals will be served in our fabulous Camp Center Kitchen by the pond. We have one conference room at the kitchen, one class room at the barn and a snack room in the barn (to try to keep too much dirt from getting into what we eat). And of course- the horses! We have American Bashkir Curlies, as well as our draft crosses (for our vaulting team).
